### Hull's gets OK to reopen to serve students

#### Art supply store receives waiver from state

By Ed Stannard

NEW HAVEN - Art and architecture students at Yale University and other schools will be able to finish their final projects — Hull's Art Supply & Framing is open again for business.

But you must be a seri-ous art student or professional to gain entry. And don't touch the merchan-dise unless you plan to

buy. Owner Shawn Szirbik requested and received a waiver from the state to reopen during the corona-virus pandemic, because he said there is a pressing educational need.
"I'm really here for the

graduate students who are stuck in town," both at Yale and other colleges and universities that have closed, Szirbik said. "The door is locked and I in-terview them at the door."

Browsing is not allowed.
"Literally there were a
couple of girls crying on
the phone. I just felt an
obligation to try to help," he said.

State Department of

Development Jim Watson said in an email that more than 900 entities in the state had sought waivers of Gov. Ned's Lamont's executive order on essential businesses as of March 25, but that the number is "inflated because a lot of companies requested essential status

when they were already classified as such." Watson said 77 waiver requests were rejected to date.

He said also in the email that the order is followed,

but "special circumstanc-

es" are considered. He said reasons for rejection of the requests have varied, as "each case is different." is different.

"Under this process "Under this process, businesses are permitted to present their justifica-tions as to why they are an 'essential business," he said in the email. "In addi-tion, we ask them how they also to maintain am they plan to maintain em-ployee safety during the COVID-19 crisis. When it comes to the parameters used for granting a waiver, we weigh public safety concerns with the broader



### By Paul Bass, The Irrepressible New Haven Indepedendent Brian McGrath, 1946-2020

Brian McGrath, a leading civic voice in New Haven for over 40 years with a permanent glint in his eye that reflected a love for mixing it up with political friend and foe alike, has died at the age of 73 after a years-long bout with cancer.

McGrath died late Thursday night [April 9] at home, peacefully, with his daughter Christina and son Brian Seto present, according to his son Sam.

"That's what he wanted," Sam said. "He wanted to be home."

The most recent generation of people involved in New Haven public life knew McGrath as the hardworking executive of the Chapel West Special Services District, where he advocated for local businesses and neighborhood renewal. In that job, he was the force behind those biographical posters of notable New Haveners like Meryl Streep, Dr. Spock, and Norman Lear hanging througout the Dwight and Upper Chapel area. He also served on the city's Redevelopment Commission, in which capacity he worked with Dwight neighbors to craft a redevelopment plan that drew on lessons from the past.

These were later acts in a lifetime of public service. Following in the footsteps of his father, McGrath worked a full career in New Haven city government. His jobs included running the traffic and parking department and overseeing economic development projects. Always outspoken, salty, with a twinkle in his eye, he loved to shock people with strong opinions—and then continue engaging with them. New Haven was his home team, and he was one if its most ardent boosters. Politics, government, and community ran through his veins.

He also worked hard on political campaigns for Democratic candidates.

It's fair to say there was no more enjoyable, provocative, and colorful person to report on in New Haven. Or a city official who more enjoyed giving parking tickets to reporters. (Or at least admitted to enjoying it.) Every day that involved an encounter with Brian McGrath felt like a day lived in full.

"With Brian there was so much energy and curiosity." He noticed everything. Always a story, and people he was loyal to whether they were in favor or not," recalled State Rep. Pat Dillon, a friend and political colleague for over 40 years. "He remembered everything and he'd tell you about it. I'll miss him so much."

Brian McGrath was born Sept. 21, 1946, to William and Joyce McGrath. William served as director of traffic and parking for the City of New Haven. Brian was the eldest of 11 children, including David, Vincent, Mary, Kevin, Rita, Beverly, Nora, and Margaret, all of whom survive him; and Raymond and Harold, who predeceased him.



Brian's curiosity spanned far and wide. Besides his passion for government and for political campaigns, he collected stamps. In fact, until his hospitalization, he served as president of the New Haven Philatelic Society, according to his son Sam. "He went faithfully [to the meetings] every Tuesday night for 40 years."

He loved playing pool. And he had a facility for learning languages. He spoke and could read German, French, Italian, Spanish, "and a little bit of Russian," Sam said. Brian was taking classes in Arabic toward the end of his life; he traveled to Israel to practice speaking it.

In New Haven, he was known most of all for his omnipresence at political gatherings, in Democratic political campaigns, and in government deliberations over transit and economic development issues.

He registered countless voters. Sam recalled his father "taking me out canvassing as far back as I could remember, until I was a senior in high school."

"Brian was one of a kind and was always an interesting person to work with. He truly loved the city, and you can say he definitely did it his way," recalled former Board of Alders President Jorge Perez, who currently serves as state banking commissioner.

Besides his brothers and sisters and his sons Sam and Brian and daughter Christina, McGrath is survived by daughters-in law Jamie McGrath and Brenda Iasevoli; son-in-law Ethan Schoenherr; and granddaughter Natalie McGrath.

The family plans to hold a public memorial gathering for Brian McGrath some time in the summer.

### Demolition begins at 1142 Chapel (Site to become Yale-owned patio)

The city's Building Department has ordered Yale University to demolish a structurally unsound former pawn shop on Chapel Street that it recently bought as part of a \$3 million-plus deal with Pike International.

City Building Official Jim Turcio sent the university that demolition order on Oct. 22 for the two-story, retail-office building at 1142 Chapel St.

Turcio's order notes that an Oct. 1 city inspection revealed that "the structure has been open to the weather since 1992 and major structural damage has occurred."

"We have been working with the City of New Haven Building Department, which required that the building be demolished because it is not safe," Yale spokesperson Karen Peart told the Independent in an emailed statement. "We are now in the process of securing a demolition permit. There are no current

plans for the site."

Yale purchased the long-vacant downtown building between York Street and Park Street on June 4 as part of a \$3.8 million deal with 1142 Chapel LLC, a holding company owned by Pike's Shmully Hecht. Hecht in turn had owned the building for three years.

According to the New Haven Register's Mary O'Leary's deep dive into the history of this property back in 2016, 1142 Chapel used to house a jewelry store, a design facility, and a pawn shop, and suffered from four fires between the 1970s and early 1990s, with the most recent taking place in 1992.

That same year, O'Leary then wrote, a 33-year-old New Haven firefighter named Tom Kelly suffered a traumatic brain injury when "he fell through an uncovered 30-foot air shaft that was part of a secondstory addition at 1142 Chapel St."





#### Renovation work continues for new Graduate New Haven Hotel


The Graduate Hotel New Haven and Chapel West Special Services District report that they are in the home stretch of their work on the renovation of the Hotel Duncan, which will be known as Graduate New Haven when it opens in the fall.

The recent work done was to connect permanent water and power lines to the Hotel. The water and electrical utilities (the Regional Water Authority and the United Illuminating Company) worked outside the Hotel and on Chapel Street in order to connect the Hotel to their systems. This work was done on a small section of Chapel street (the block in front of the hotel) from about June 22 to August 5, during which there was a barricade in the street to protect the utility construction workers, and one lane of traffic (and restricted parking) on Chapel Street

between York Street and Park Street. As the sidewalk was closed, pedestrian access was continued on the north side of the street (the hotel-side of the street) around the construction site and protected by the barricade.

Some utility work is still being planned (that will happen on Chapel Street); they are still waiting on some information from the utilities.

From the Graduate New Haven: "We appreciate your patience and we apologize for any inconvenience during the period construction and any impacts on Chapel Street. We are very excited to be joining the New Haven community, and we cannot wait to open our doors and welcome the neighborhood in when we open this fall."

### Yale New Haven Hospital plans to build \$838 million state-of-the-art Neurosciences Center on Saint Raphael Campus

The project will consist of two buildings (Sherman Building adjacent to Sherman Avenue and McGivney Building atop of the existing McGivney Center.

Parking to support the project will be achieved by an expansion and renovation of the existing parking structure on Orchard Street. A 200-car parking lot will be constructed under the new building.

The project is being developed in collaboration with the City of New Haven to ensure mutual

benefit In addition to the significant economic impact of the project and new jobs created, Yale New Haven will:

- Work with the city of New Haven to drive savings and provide enhanced access for employees covered by the city's health plan
- Provide a \$3 million voluntary "bridge" payment to allow the City to achieve such savings.
- Advance nearly \$9 million in building and permit fees to provide an immediate and positive impact on the city's budget.

#### 44 Apts Planned At Howe Gas Station

The owners of a Howe Street gas station plan to knock down the fuel pumps and mini-mart and build in their stead ... wait for it ...

... dozens of new market-rate apartments!

Forty four units, to be precise.

The proposed new sixstory apartment complex would be located at 49 Howe St. at the corner of Crown Street, right behind the Tandoor Indian restaurant on Chapel Street.

Gas station landlordturned-developer **Murad "Mike" Charania** 

and local architect **Ken Boroson** presented the latest Howe Street apartment project at Tuesday [June 4] night's Dwight Community Management Team meeting in the Amistad Middle School gym on Edgewood Avenue.

Dwight neighbors, seemingly exhausted by the recent rush of market rate residential developments planned for Howe Street and geared towards Yale students and hospital professionals, pushed Charania and Boroson to include affordable units in the project.

Boroson said the planned five-over-one, podium-style building will contain 28 one-bedroom apartments, six two-bedroom apartments, and 10 "micro-units." The "micro-units" will be roughly 425 square feet each, the one-bedrooms 650 square feet each, and the two-bedrooms 1,100 square feet each.

"It's designed as workforce housing," he said. Its target market will be nurses, technicians, and other staff at the nearby St. Raphael's Hospital and at Yale New Haven Hospital's proposed new \$838 million neuroscience research center.

The development will also have 21 on-site surface parking spaces, six bike racks, 3,000 square feet of amenity space, and a ground floor retail space.

### 60+ Apartments planned for 104 Howe St lot

From New Haven Independent writer Thomas Breen:

'A local developer has submitted plans to build a sevenstory, 97-unit apartment complex atop a Howe Street surface parking lot — while intending, he said, to end up building more like 60 apartments.

On March 15, Cambridge Realty Partners submitted the preliminary plans to the City Plan department for a proposed new apartment complex at 104 Howe St.

Nick Falker, a partner at the international development and property management company based out of 817 Grand Ave., told the Independent that these plans are still in the very early stages of development. The ultimate project will wind up looking quite different than what was included in this initial submission, he said.

It is one of two planned projects that aim to bring a total of around 100 new apartments to the busy block.

"The proposed plan is significantly larger than what we are going to do," Falker told the Independent by email on Wednesday afternoon. "Our goal is to optimize the site, without over or underutilizing the space. Based on our very early stage design, we feel that a 60-unit building, at or below the height of the neighboring buildings, will best achieve that. Ultimately, the final size and density will be determined and agreed to by us and the City. We are looking forward to continuing that conversation."

According to the preliminary plans, the proposed 40,646 square-foot development would stand seven floors tall with a roof deck on top.

The plan identifies a total of 97 residential units, including 23 two-bedrooms, 12 one-bedrooms, and 62 studios.

"Our intent is to offer reasonable rents," Falker said, "in-line with market."

The plan also identifies 4,650 square feet of amenity space and 40 parking spaces, 32 on site at 104 Howe and eight next door at 100 Howe.

The plan will require zoning relief.

Cambridge purchased the surface parking lot, as well as the the adjacent six-story, 84-unit apartment complex at 100 Howe St. and a handful of smaller residential buildings on Edgewood Avenue and Howe Street, on Feb. 13 for a combined sum of \$15.3 million.

"We love the location," Falker said. "We are very excited to develop a new building that will complement the neighborhood."

City Deputy Economic Development Administrator Steve Fontana told the Independent that, even in the project's stages, the city supports the developer's plans to convert the existing lot into a more productive use for the neighborhood.

"We've had a few conversations with the new owners of the property regarding the kind of project that they'd like to pursue on the site," he said, "and we're pleased that they're interested in designing an efficient and attractive building that makes the best use of it. We support the idea of creating a residential or mixed-use building there that fits in aesthetically with the other structures on the block."

### Graduate New Haven completes city approval process

The new owners of **Graduate New Haven** formerly known as **The Duncan Hotel** at 1181 Chapel Street, have completed the final step in the city approval process with the granting of a Special Exception by the New Haven Board of Zoning Appeals which allows for the issuance of a Hotel Liquor Permit as well as forgiveness of the requirement to supply 59 parking spaces in order to open a 72 room hotel and ground floor restaurant. The liquor permit is a significant and welcome departure from the norm as it will enhance the hotel's business by permitting alcoholic beverages to be served downstairs in the planned first class restaurant in the space once occupied by the Old Heidelberg, upstairs in both the new lobby lounge and the meeting rooms, and even in the patron's rooms should the hotel supply complimentary champagne from time to





time in the rooms or via the small refrigerator room bars. The Chapel West Special Services District, as well as our partners, the Dwight Central Management Team, and the Greater Dwight Development Corporation have supported this redevelopment effort from the start and have been in attendance at all of the hearings speaking in favor of the proposed renovation. Linda Townsend Maier, director of the Greater Dwight Development Corporation, noted that the new hotel would bring additional pedestrians to the sidewalks of that block, both increasing security and vitality of the area. Brian McGrath, speaking on behalf of the Dwight Central Management Team and the Chapel West Special Services District, simply noted that the parking relief would not pose any new problems in the District as the former Duncan Hotel operated with no parking for 90 rooms and a restaurant while the new hotel would reduce the number of rooms to 72. He noted that in the next block on Chapel, west of Park Street, there are empty parking meters all day long. Arnie Lehrer, Secretary of Chapel West ssp, and property owner in the area, said that the new hotel will increase tax revenue to the city and convert a decaying building into a renovated bustling hub. "What I see are very few negatives and a lot of positives." Construction on the interior of the building has been underway for months. By the time of publication of this newsletter, a scaffold will have been erected over the sidewalk in front of the property to protect pedestrian traffic while the facade of the building is being restored.

The renovated hotel expects to open in September 2019.

### Michelle's House center to open across from Yale-NH Hospital

From New Haven Independent writer Markeshia Ricks (whose photos are also used here): The Southern Connecticut Sickle Cell Disease Association of America is working as feverishly as anyone can rehabbing a 100-plus-year-old, threestory building to open the center across from the Yale-New Haven Hospital St. Raphael campus at Chapel and Orchard with lots of in-kind and



pro-bono help.
The association is leasing the building from Yale-New Haven for \$1. Once it is up and running, the community center will be formally called "Michelle's House" in honor of the former first lady.

Jim Rawlings, chairman of the association's board of directors and a retired Yale-New Haven executive, said the hope is that adding Obama's name to the center will raise the profile of a disease that has stood in the shadows for far too long.

The center's aim will be to educate the community at large, including the health and medical community, about sickle cell and break the stigma surrounding a disease that impacts people with ancestors from sub-Saharan Africa,



South America, the Caribbean, and Central America; Saudi Arabia; India; and Mediterranean countries such as Turkey, Greece, and Italy, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

In addition to working to educate the community about sickle cell and the trait that causes it, the center will be a resource both for children who have fallen behind because of the disease and for their parents. They'll have access to tutors and social workers. Rawlings also plans to meet with school superintendents of the major urban centers in the state to talk about how to help families and children impacted by the disease.

#### Hull's: New owners, new plans

Great things are happening at Hull's Art Supply and Framing, under the new ownership of Shawn Szirbik, who purchased the business after having assisted Steve Kovel for many years, including during its 1999 move from its original location at 1203 Chapel Street (where Shawn fondly recounts having been a customer as a child) to its present location at 1144 Chapel.

Shawn is the fourth owner of Hull's in its 70 year history. After briefly having run Jerry's Art-O-Rama in West Hartford, he returned to Hull's in 2001 and ten years ago was given a 20% stake with the understanding that he would eventually buy the company. Thanks to Steve's generosity (and a lot of help from Start Bank) he was able to take possession of Hull's in August of 2016. Longtime employee of 13 years **Stewart Johnson** will also become an equity partner.

Some of Shawn and his wife **Deb**'s goals for the future of Hull's include updating the company's systems and inventory control, the expansion of outreach to the community, and expansion of commercial / institutional business. He has also been working on converting an area above the store into a gallery space that will be used for vendor events, classes & workshops, pop-up art shows, and also as a space for meetings as well as for a community gathering space.



The Hull's logo has also recently received a fresh reworking (done by Margaret at StroCo) to coincide with the establishment of the store's new ownership.

Shawn has also joined the Chapel West Board of Commisioners as a voting member.







The storied Hotel Duncan has officially been sold and will undergo an upgrade that is expected to be finished by early 2019. AJ Capital Partners said it has closed a deal with Stirling Shapiro of Duncan Associates, Inc., who confirmed the purchase price was \$8 million. The 123-year-old New Haven institution, with its 90 rooms, is currently split between a traditional hotel and 38 tenants in single occupancy rooms. It will reopen for business with a new name, fewer rooms and more amenities. The new hotel will have 72 rooms for guests, a game room, a lobby coffee shop and it will continue to have a basement level restaurant. After decades of owning the Duncan, Shapiro said it was time to retire, but he is not leaving immediately. He will stay in the area and plans to spend a lot of time with his grandchildren.



#### Chapel/Dwight/Whalley Proposed Redevelopment Plan

The New Haven Redevelopment Agency has begun the process of reenacting redevelopment plans for various parts of New Haven. The basic concept is that within a redevelopment plan area properties which are abandoned, blighted, or necessary to restore the economic function of a particular area can be acquired by the City in partnership with a developer and redeveloped according to the City and relevant neighborhood plan. In the last few months, the Redevelopment Agency has been meeting with the elected Boards of Chapel West, Greater Dwight, and Whalley Avenue. A draft plan, to be entitled Chapel/Dwight/Whalley Redevelopment Plan is nearly ready to be sent for public hearings by the Agency, the Board of Aldermen, and the City Plan Commission. The Agency earlier decided to start this process in the Chapel West/Dwight area because the entire area is ably represented by elected boards and each district included within the plan area already has a future land use and development plan prepared earlier. Once a Redevelopment Plan is enacted by the City, the neighborhood organizations may use the City's powers as a tool to accomplish their objectives.

#### Bun Lai of Miya's honored as a Sole Chef in Nation as White House Champion of Change

Along with Climate Change, over-fishing is a top threat to the health of the oceans. Today, the world is facing one of the greatest extinction periods in its history due to human activity. The cuisine at Miya's was created to find delicious and novel solutions to some of the greatest ecological problems. Many of the sustainable sushi recipes created at Miya's, are emulated by sushi restaurants around the world.

For his family's restaurant's pioneering work in ocean conservation, Bun Lai was honored with a White House Champions of Change award at the White House on October 7 and was invited back again on November 20th. Of the dozen recipients, he is the only chef in the country to have been awarded in the category of Sustainable Seafood Champions. His Barack of Ribs is a recipe he created for President Barack Obama, for the Miya's dinner held at the White House. It is currently being offered on the Miya's menu and features a fall-off-the-bone-tender baked invasive carp ribs. Miya's, founded in Connecticut in 1983 by Bun's mother, Yoshiko Lai, is the first sustainable sushi restaurant in the world, specializing in nutrition and food

access, sustainable seafood, plant-based sushi, and the utilization of edible invasive species. Yoshiko Lai was also recently honored with a congressional award by Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro, a pioneer in creating legislation for food safely in imported seafood.

Bun Lai is a James Beard Foundation nominated chef, a Nationals and Olympic-trials wrestling coach, a healthy-eating educator who has been the director of nutrition for New Haven Farms, a not-for-profit that serves low income pre-diabetics. He is a board member of ActualFood, a Research & Development Laboratory reinventing grocery retail to make food as preventative medicine accessible for all. He sits on the council of True Health Initiative, a

worldwide coalition of health experts committed to proven principles of lifestyle as medicine. He has written for publications such as Scientific American Magazine and collaborates extensively with Yale University. He has spoken at a wide range of institutions from Google, Harvard School of Public Health, World Wildlife Fund, and National Geographic to the American Fisheries Society.

Miya's has been featured in a plethora of nationally and internationally well-known media, and was most recently featured in The New York Times, Popular Mechanics Magazine, and Vice Munchies. Miya's is currently being filmed for a feature length documentary about the restaurant, and a television adventure education series.

"Miya's owes all of our successes to our friends in the New Haven community who have supported us over decades at our mother's little eatery. Miya's is an example of how, when we work together, you just never knows how far the ripples we make may go."



#### Walter

Walter Camp is considered the "Father of American Football".

In 1863, the Camp family moved to 170 Chapel Street. 3 years later they moved to 595 Chapel & in 1884 moved to 1303 Chapel St. Walter lived at home until his marriage in 1888.

After attending the Hopkins Grammar School in New Haven, Camp enrolled at Yale and graduated in 1880. He stayed on at Yale to study medicine for two years.



#### Camp

Camp played football at Yale from 1876 to 1882, the final two years as a medical student. In 1876 he played halfback in the first Harvard-Yale game. As the team captain for the next three years, Camp developed rule changes that cast the foundation of modern American football such as the snapback from center, the system of downs, and the points


system, as well as the introduction of the nowstandard offensive arrangement of players.



The house is historically known for being the home of Walter Camp, who lived there from 1884 to 1888.










#### CW History

This rendering of the original **St. Raphael's Hospital** is probably the earliest, dating circa 1910. The Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth came to New Haven at the request of local physicians who wished to have a hospital that would be open to all members of the medical profession and would "receive and care for all patients without regard to race, creed or color; to extend charity to the sick and poor and needy." A 12-bed hospital was opened at 1442 Chapel Street in the Barnes Residence in 1907, next to the Grace Hospital. It soon after grew to require expansion and Saint Mary Pavilion was built and opened in 1910. Today Saint Raphael's continues the mission it started with. In 2015, the hospital was merged with Yale-New Haven Hospital.





David is a graduate of Quinnipiac University, where he received a BA in Marketing.












at the Colony Inn (now **The Study** at **Yale**). Cubby played for weeks at a time. This was an era of live






#### **NH Stamp Club Centennial**
